The name of Elsie Baker, noted contralto, who will appear here on the Lyceum course Friday evening, January 28th, with supporting artists carries with it a delightful anticipation to music lovers.

Miss Baker is widely known throughout America not only for her concert work, but also for the large number of Victrola records she has made.

"Elsie Baker possesses that rare treasure, a real contralto, and what is more she knows how to use it." This quotation from a leading Philadelphia newspaper sums up in brief the qualifications as to voice and ability that have made this American contralto one of the most popular concert artists of today.

In addition to her vocal and artistic qualifications Miss Baker is fortunate in possessing great personal charm, both in appearance and manner, a fact which immediately makes itself felt with her audiences.

Miss Baker has been secured for a transcontinental tour under the management of the Redpath Bureau. With her will appear William Durieux, cellist, and Marion Carley, pianist, both of whom are artists of rare attainments.

HEAR STATE HEALTH NURSE

An interesting talk was given last Tuesday morning by Miss Romany, state health department. She intended primarily to speak to the girls, showing them the advantages and benefits of taking up nursing as a vocation; but was persuaded to give her talk to the whole assembly.

She spoke on the subject of Health. By the observance of a few simple rules, she showed us that good health may be enjoyed by almost every individual. There are five points necessary to good health—the right kind of food—that is simple food which contains the five elements, plenty of sleep, an abundance of fresh air, cleanliness and sufficient exercise. People seldom stop to consider these rules until they are sick. For that reason doctors are commencing to give more attention to preventing illness than curing it. She gave some helpful hints on keeping well, which were most interesting and beneficial. She then talked to the girls on the subject of nursing. It seems that many of the hardships of the training have been removed and that it is now an enjoyable and lucrative profession.

Her talk was a timely answer to the question which so many girls are now asking. "What am I to do with my life?"
